Our New Year's Blessing.

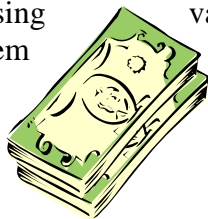

Then we gave him Baraka for a last name because it means blessings. We think Moses is about one and one half years old.

Moses Baraka is adjusting to his new home, gaining strength and recovering from his wounds. God has given him hope and a future. Praise the Lord!
